


Northern engagement includes the individuals from northern organizations working directly within Projects as partners, collaborators, staff, students, technicians



ARCTICNET EXPERIENCE - ENGAGEMENT IS A PROCESS

Increase in Inuit driven questions at the centre of the research being conducted

 ex. 2011 and 2014 Food Security proposals were designed to support regional food security strategies in Nunavik and Nunatsiavut and their data needs

More action oriented research being conducted

 intervention evaluation and implementation science is becoming a more common as part of research program

More repeat Inuit research staff/reps are involved at various levels of projects including development, conduct and reporting

now see some projects co-led with Inuit org rep

Enhanced knowledge mobilization process through involvement and control in project by Inuit partners and immediate use of results in local and regional decision making

ex. Nunatsiavut food security strategy development


